Use the following steps to help you come up with your own fairy tale story!
You can write short sentences and draw pictures to help plan your ideas!



Step 1: Pick a moral for your story

A moral is something your readers or viewers will learn from reading or watching your fairy tale. For example your fairy tale may be about being kind and nice to everyone.

Step 2: Create your hero

Step 3: Create your villain
